After crossing the Atlantic to the Caribbean they cruised to the inter coastal water way and have left their Seadog with friends at Chesapeke Bay. And then have flown home to Holland. PERKINS 4107/8

To date I know of five cases where the braided pipes to the oil cooler have fractured. Not noticed by one owner, not a Seadog, until the engine had siezed. So I have had words with the Perkins engineers. The very latest 4108 low line - at the Southampton Boat Show - did not have an oil cooler as the company have decided the oil runs too cool. A modification can be supplied which is available from Perkins agents. The bracket, onto which the oil filter is screwed and also has the unions for the braided pipes to the oil cooler can be replaced by a modified bracket that does not have the unions. (The oil just does a U turn within it) The bracket is fitted to the crankcase on two studs so it should be fairly easily carried out. (So they tell me).

RADAR

Scanners are sprouting in profusion on the Mizzen masts of Seadogs. Decca 050 Decca 060 - Seascan III - Seaveyor. And it is intriguing the position of brackets, types of brackets and the various ideas on re-rigging the jumper and possibly the triatic stays. Also the position of the display head. Although the re-rigging goes from one extreme to the other as yet no reports of a fracured mizzen!

While modifying our navigation department, I removed the back panel behind the chart table and replaced with $\frac{1}{2}$ " marine ply vertical panel gaining just over 2" which allowed the display head to be fixed that much further back. The panel also supports the remaining radio.

We have removed the quarter berth mattress, reversed the hinges on the chart table and the space below is used for all the extra charts.

MAST STEPS

After the introduction lastspring of the Birds Bosuns Rope Ladder, we have found on EMRA this to be invaluable. One occasion on a modification of the triatric to an aerial meant two ascents of both masts. This was reasonably easy with the ladder but would have been hard work for the two of us even with our 4-part tackle.

OCEAN DOG

John and Gladys Panton have bought! TARA, the Reg. Freeman designed, 33' wood construction 'Seadog' and brought her to the Autumn Meeting.

The Freemans kindly supplied the following gen:-

To remove the Propeller from a Seadog.

- 1. Take the pin out of propeller nut and slacken 2 turns
- 2. Remove shaft flexible coupling and slide tail shaft inboard until the propeller rests against the stern bearing.
- Heat propeller boss with blow lamp and give sharp inward blow to propeller nut using a copper hammer or steel hammer with a piece of plywood to protect the nut.

 (If at first you don't succeed cool shaft and try again)
- 4. To replace propeller, place propeller over end of shaft, push shaft outwards until key-way is exposed, replace key, slide propeller into position and push on hand-hard. Replace flexible coupling, replace shaft nut and tighten nut whilst holding propeller still.

 Adjust propeller nut to line up with hole and replace shaft pin.
- N.B. Prior to removing propeller check shaft outer bearing for wear.

 Movement of more than 1/16th" indicates that the bearing is due for replacement.

 If the bearing is to be replaced, slacken the clamp not on the bearing housing (or take out grub-screw where applicable), rotate cutlass bearing with a large pair of stillsons. This will loosen the cutlass bearing. This should be done before the shaft is drawn back.

SAIL FOR SALE

Working jib 162' white terylene made by Atlantic Racing Sails in 1974. (B.L. had run out of credit with Ratseys) Not used since 1977 when we converted to Rotostay and a new tem genny from Jeckels. Definitely suit a left-handed sailor as all the hanks are sewn on the opposite way round to usual. (To stop them being unhanked by the second forestay). Contact D.E.

TEAK

Last Spring we cleaned the teak right down and then applied Sadolin (Pine shade - not teak), brushed on first then rubbed with a cloth. Subsequent applications with a cloth. And it stayed well all the summer only having about two whole applications and the odd ' patching' where the centre of the bulwark had been rubbed by rough springs of yachts alongside. On laying up the teak was cleaned with detergent and soft 'pan-scrubber', SADOLIN applied and it still looks superb. I even use it at home on the teak thresholds of ye olde Porch! Further report next Spring after the ravages of winter.
